On Thursday 27th May, Martin was presented with an award for "International Achievement", by the British Academy of Composers & Songwriters, at the 44th Ivor Novello Awards, at The Grosvenor House Hotel in Park Lane in London. Martin was presented with his award by Daniel Miller, whose speech commended Martin's work as Depeche Mode's songwriter, and the fact that for nearly 20 years the band have managed to connect, through their music, with people all over the world. There were over 1000 guests, and Paul Gambaccini hosted the event. Congratulations Martin!

Please note, that the re-issue of the **3 CD Singles Box Sets**, DMBX1, DMBX2 & DMBX3 is now scheduled for 18th October, not 6th September as stated in Bong 40. They will be limited to 15,000 copies each, and some will be exported to Germany and the USA. Only a limited number will be sent out for review, as they were all previously available.

The latest video compilation **The Videos 86-98** is due to be released on DVD in the USA on 5th October. Plans for UK/European release are not yet finalised.

The very beginning of "Blasphemous Rumours" was used by NBC in America during their broadcast of the NBA game between the Seattle Supersonics and Detroit Pistons. During half-time, there was an interview with Orlando Magic guard Anfernee Hardaway concerning his decision whether to remain with his current team or sign with another. The very beginning of the song where the slow beats occur was used at the beginning as well as the end of the interview. This game was televised nationally on Sunday, March 27, 1999.

"Pimpf" was used by Sky Box Office as background music to the trailer for 'The Devil's Advocate' movie in June.

On Sunday, April 25, the German TV channel RTL 2 once again broadcast an hour-long recording of the Band's performance on October 5,1998 in Cologne, Germany during "The Singles Tour 86-98".

On April 18, "Barrel Of A Gun" was used as background music in a report about mobile phones during a TV programme called 'Capital' on the French channel M6.

Page 695 of the UK Computer Shopper Magazine for June 1999 features a section on Virtual Private Networking. The article is split into five main sections titled as follows: Master And Servant, New Life, Get The Balance Right, Shake The Disease and Everything Counts.

Depeche Mode were voted "Favourite All Time Band" by listeners to KROQ 106.7 FM, a Southern Californian alternative rock radio station, in their annual Memorial Day countdown.

Virgin Radio are using "Personal Jesus" in an ad for their daily classic countdown.

The video for "Never Let Me Down Again" was played on the German TV music channel VIVA2 during their show '2Rock' on Wednesday, June 16. It was requested by an American band called Bloodhound Gang, who describe themselves as deep devoted Depeche Mode fans. The singer even did some 'Dave dancing' on the show and sang bits of "Everything Counts" and "Shake The Disease".

There is a new video for "Policy Of Truth" available! This time, however, it is a video for the song covered by the band Kuibul and is taken from the Russian tribute album "Depesha Dlya Depeche Mode" (see Bong 39 for more details).

On Wednesday, June 17, a 90-second remix of the instrumental part of "It's No Good" was used as background music during a trailer for the German film 'Drei stahlharte Profis'.

An excerpt of "Clean" was used during a report about the Internet virus 'Explore.Zip Worm' on Sunday, June 20 on the German TV channel Sat 1.

On June 18, the German TV channel RTL broadcast a programme called 'Life-Die Lust zu leben', and around 10 seconds of "Enjoy The Silence" could be heard during a report about flirting in Majorca. They also used some snippets of "Home", "Condemnation" and "Strangelove" in several other reports. There seems to be a real fan amongst the production team!

Several excerpts of "Useless" were used during a recent report about special car models called 'Auto, Motor, Sport' on June 20, 1999. The show was broadcast on the German TV channel VOX.

"Clean" and "Pimpf" were used as background music in a report about law during a programme called 'Sans Aucun Doute' on the French TV TF1.

The June issue of Select magazine (UK) published the results of research carried out by The Journal of Psychiatry and Mental Health Nursing, regarding the influence of music over peoples moods. Depeche Mode made twelve of their volunteers, who were already angry, feel even angrier, while Boney M's "Brown Girl In The Ring" produced the best results!

The American series 'Nash Bridges', starring Don Johnson, used "It's No Good" and "In Your Room" as background music in an episode about a serial killer who targeted female models.

'Who owns who' an article in the June issue of Q magazine gave a run down of both major and independent labels, with a nice little DM picture thrown in for good measure.

Janet and Jordan made an appearance as backing singers for Placebo and David Bowie during this year's Brit Awards.

"Useless" was used as background music during 'Blitzlicht' a show on the German TV channel Sat 1 in March. They also used fragments of "Nothing" about three times during the same show.

VH-1 used "Just Can't Get Enough" on a trailer for Bob Mill's Big 80's weekend in April.

Brilliant to see Granada Men + Motors channel (UK) showing Depeche Mode performing "See You" live on The Best of The Tube back in April.

On May 22, the Swedish radio station P3 used the intro of "Waiting For The Night" for a fictional story about a boy who had a sleeping disorder.

On June 10, "Barrel Of A Gun" was used as background music on MTV America during the MTV special 'Nine movie moments that made the 90's'.



As this Century draws to a close, I've been thinking about things that have influenced my life, especially during past six or so years. There are so many things, too many to number, but musically, Depeche Mode have been there for me. Their music is rich with emotion, melody and passion. I find I always come back to Depeche Mode in one way or another.

I've been a fan of Depeche Mode close to 16 years now, and my enthusiasm has never waned. I've collected as much material as money will allow...and now have a rather healthy Mode collection. Even though the Australian music industry can be a little backward in its attitudes, I've been able to find the occasional oddity and rarity. (The label that distributes Depeche Mode in Australia has changed its distribution rights from Festival to Sony

and back to Festival in the past five years!)

When I "came out" six years ago, Depeche Mode "Songs Of Faith And Devotion" was a very therapeutic album for me. I found solace in the album's spiritual tones and self-redemption themes. In the uncertainty of changing one's lifestyle...the music of Depeche Mode helped me. (And other music, too, but my emphasis here is on DM!). When the Band finally returned to Sydney after four years... I was in a state of elation. I was only four rows from the stage...and had one of the best nights! Even now, small moments are permanently etched in my memory.



As a gay man living in the late 90's...I have discovered that Depeche Mode have quite a sizeable gay following. I recently worked on Sydney's newest gay/lesbian radio station OUTFM as a DJ and my

first show was a Depeche Fest...three hours of DM from the earliest to the latest. After my show, a few DM tracks seemed to filter through on other shows. Each season that OUTFM has had I've made a pact with myself to play some Mode on air...as Sydney radio is still rather ignorant of Depeche Mode.

don't think Depeche Mode realise how much influence they have on Australian bands. A couple of bands that I know personally list Depeche Mode as one of their main influences; one from Brisbane...Tycho Brahe were actually praised by saying that one of their songs was like a Depeche Mode song. A local band called Neuropa has a definite Mode sound in some of their songs...and both members idolise them! Another band...Snog - a hardcore synth dance band, actually used a lot of samples from Violator on their first album, and finally a band by the name of Static Icon who have had some success in Europe, were originally a Mode cover band in Adelaide.

The past four years have been the best for me personally, and again, Depeche Mode have had a hand in pushing that along. When "Ultra" came out... I was feeling a lot better about myself... the strength of the songs shone through...and one of my all time favourites for a long time..."Home" became a well played track. I even dedicated the song to my parents (as a thank you for supporting me) on OUTFM. Despite all the panning I heard about the album being too different... I quietly congratulated DM for producing an outstanding album. The lyrics were about exorcising demons of the past, finding your true self, spiritual healing...and of course a new classic Mode song..."It's No Good". I felt I could relate to the songs, as I have in the past. I could lose myself in the intricate melodies and sounds.

I suppose what I'm trying to say in all of this is that everyone finds their own reasons for liking a band. My reasons are varied...and they all come back to one thing. Depeche Mode are a true pop band that have lasted for a long time and I've grown up with them. There are times when I take political meaning from them ("Condemnation" has overtones of gay acceptance in it), and sometimes the songs have a therapeutic quality to them or I'll just enjoy the songs for what they are. I am a fan of Depeche Mode, and I am proud of it...what's your story?

When "Painkiller" began, it was accompanied by the beginning of the "101" movie on the huge video screen. "Sister Of Night" was accompanied by the video for the Devotional version of "Never Let Me Down Again" (with the spaceman). "Behind The Wheel" was played along with the video for "Halo". We used the original videos for "Only When I Lose Myself" and "Enjoy The Silence". The "Laura Palmer's Theme" was accompanied by the video for "Walking In My Shoes". Ingrid and Zineke danced on the stage during "Just Can't Get Enough", "It's No Good" and "Only When I Lose Myself".

After "Painkiller" it was a time for me to go on stage and by the beginning of "A Question Of Time" the whole hall rocked. It immediately gave me a good feeling. "Just Can't Get Enough" was known by everyone and was a guaranteed success. "Master And Servant" was even more rebellious and I was already turning with my mike stand. When we started to play "Sister Of Night", most people didn't know how to react. I personally think that it is a beautiful song and it is a pity that it wasn't released as a single. I moved a lot during "It's No Good" (Maybe Dave could learn

certainly learned something of Dave's moves on stage). Then came the highlight - "Behind The Wheel". When the song started the hall exploded. I thought I was in the middle of a house-disco. I was assisted by two dancers, who laid their hands on my shoulders at the "did I need to..." part. I think this song which captures something very sensual and is full of fire and mystery is often underestimated by a lot of fans.

"Personal Jesus" and "Enjoy The Silence" received the same reaction as "Just Can't Get Enough" and then it was over and it was time for Twin Peaks (the mystery serial with Dale "damn good coffee" Cooper).



Pre-Tour

Since the tour was announced in May 1998, I have been frantically on the phone or Internet getting information on where to obtain tickets for all the gigs. Also I obtained an International Rail timetable to ensure that it would be possible to travel and get to all of the concerts. About three months was spent obtaining tickets for most of the gigs, and planning the trains around Europe. The decision to do Estonia, Latvia and Russia was taken at the beginning of August, so a frantic three weeks to organise visa for Russia, flights, trains even though we did not have tickets!

1st September 98 - London to Tallinn, Estonia

Flew out from London to Tallinn, Estonia, via Vienna. A missed flight connection at Vienna meant that we had to fly via Vilnius, Latvia and then on to Tallinn, Estonia from there. Of course on arrival at Tallinn, the baggage went missing! This turned up at the hotel later that night. Met some Estonia DM Fan Club members at the Airport who had secured my tickets for Tartu and Riga.

2nd September 98 – Tartu, Estonia

The Estonian Fan Club gave us a lift by car from Tallin to Tartu. A quick dash to the airport to see DM arrive by plane. There was quite a reception there for them, and we drove back in convoy to the venue. Not the sort of thing we can do in England! The venue was an openair arena, and being the first night the anticipation was high. A good crowd of people were gathering around the entrance for the 6 o'clock

doors open. A long wait for Purity was greeted enthusiastically from the crowd but this was nothing compared to when DM came on stage just after 9pm. Opening with "A Question of Time", the crowd went absolutely wild, it was difficult to stay on one's feet, and after about four songs I had moved three-foot from my original position just from the movement of the crowd! Being the first concert there were a few technical hitches, Dave looked a bit nervous for the first four songs but soon settled into the groove. Martin's mike could have been turned up a bit, as he was very distant on "Home". In all a good first concert, the crowd went home very happy, and the weather held - just as well for an open-air concert. After the concert we all got in the car and drove to Riga, Latvia overnight along with several other fans. Getting lost in Latvia was fun, as there where no road signs!

3rd September 98 – Riga, Latvia

After some sleep, had a quick look around Riga, a small pleasant city. On the way back to the hotel, bumped into Janet and Jordan. Then we went to the Tennis Hall at Jurmala, on the outskirts of Riga. When the taxi driver did not know where the venue was, we got a bit worried, but he eventually found it okay. After Tartu the venue was a bit disappointing, very small. Around 5000 people packed into the tennis hall, and boy did it get hot. A spirited performance by DM, the acoustics not very good, but the Latvian crowd really went wild and it was great to hear them singing the chorus' with full gusto. Afterwards went to the after party in the centre of Riga and ended up staying there till 5 am before heading back to the hotel for some much needed sleep.

4th September 98 - Riga/Moscow

A day off sightseeing in Riga, then overnight by train from Riga to Moscow. This is the only border control in the world that I have passed through where the border guard, in plain English said "good luck" as he handed back my passport!

5th September 98 – Moscow, Russia

Arrival at the Riga station in Moscow. As not many foreigners come in via this station, there was no money exchange, no tourist centre, nothing! After scouting the area found a department store which had a money exchange, a Metro station which at least had a map, albeit in Russian! From here I would be

able to navigate anywhere. After finding our hotel it was off to the venue to try and obtain a ticket, but not speaking a word of Russian this proved to be very difficult. Eventually obtained tickets. Later met up with Ilja from Estonia again, and he put us in touch with two other English people who had come to see DM in Moscow - two others? They where Lee North and Andrew Winter who had also come over from the UK to see DM. Venue was huge, a massive crowd and the concert was a blinder. About half way through the concert the top of the M on the DM light display fell off, making the stage look very unique! The best part of the concert was on "Somebody", the whole arena was lit up with candles, the most I have ever witnessed. It is a moment I will never forget. Afterwards we went to a Russian bar with Estonian/Russian/UK fans for some beer, pool and dancing. A good night was had by all.

6th September 98 – Moscow, Russia

Day off sightseeing, then overnight by train to St. Petersburg, along with half of the other Russian DM fans! With several trains going overnight from Moscow to St. Petersburg, it was by chance that we were all on the same train, so we all met up in one compartment and organised beer drinking through the early hours of the morning. That's what happens when four Brits meet up in a foreign country!

7th September 98 – St. Petersburg, Russia

After yet another sleepless night it was time to get up and get to the venue, situated quite a way out from St. Petersburg. Looking at the venue it was similar in style to the one in Moscow - deja vu. After the fiasco to get in, (no queues, just a mass of people in a crush), the performance by DM was the most polished performance yet, ironing out most of the technical hitches expected early on in the tour. Once again on "Somebody" the place lit up, making the arena look more like a church than a concert venue - brilliant. Afterwards we tried to get into the hotel where DM were staying, but alas we were unsuccessful. So we went to a bar around the corner and said farewell to our Russian friends who have been very good hosts the last three days. Without them we would have struggled to get around in Russia. It shows that all around the world, DM fans help each other out.

8th September 98 – St. Petersburg, Russia Day off sightseeing.

9th September 98 – Helsinki, Finland

Took the morning train from St. Petersburg to Helsinki. Had to get a hotel on the outskirts because the centre of Helsinki was booked out - I wonder why? Met some Russian fans sightseeing in the centre, they had come by bus for 20 odd hours from Moscow to see DM in Helsinki - devotion or what? The venue was very modern, and it was the first place we had tickets for. They where seating tickets and I could not have picked a better seat, right next to the stage on the right hand side. Another polished performance by DM, the sound echoed a bit around the stadium spoilt the acoustics a bit. The crowd were brilliant, a lot of people standing and dancing in the aisles. Afterwards we bid farewell to Ilja, Lee and Andrew, but we would meet them again at Wembley, only 15 concerts away!



10th September 98 – Helsinki to Stockholm & Copenhagen

Early start to catch ferry from Turku to Stockholm. Met some of the DM stage crew on the ferry and got to know about what each of them were doing on the tour, and what other gigs they have worked on - most of them seem to have done Pink Floyd! After the 10-hour ferry journey it was straight onto the overnight train to Copenhagen from Stockholm. The crew travel by bus.

11th September 98 – Copenhagen, Denmark After sightseeing around Copenhagen, had beers with some Danish DM fans before heading to the concert venue. A big hall type venue, it got

very hot and very sticky again. "NLMDA" was done by much gusto from the crowd. A fairly good concert.

12th September 98 - Gothenburg, Sweden

A day travelling by train to Gothenburg, then after a quick sightseeing tour it was once again to the venue for another polished performance by DM. We stood slightly towards the back of the stage, watching Martin swapping his guitars over between songs. Great stuff.

13th September 98 - Stockholm, Sweden

Train over to Stockholm and then to the venue. We did not have good seats for this concert so I do not remember much about it!

14th September 98 - Stockholm to Malmo

Train to Malmo to catch overnight train to Prague. This involved a three-hour ferry crossing over to Sassnitz, Germany where they actually put the train on the ferry.

15th September 98 - Prague, Czech Republic

First day washed out by rain. Met some of the Czech DM fans in Wenceslas Square, also a lot of Polish fans in attendance. It is a shame that DM did not do Poland this time around. The venue was a really cool venue, with no assigned seating or standing, just go where you want. Thus getting to the front was hard work but worth it. The crowd was brilliant.

16th September 98 – Vienna, Austria

The first of many 'Messehalles' on this tour. I thought the crowd where a bit reserved for what was a very good performance by DM.

17th September 98 – Vienna, Austria

Day off sightseeing in Vienna, and then an overnight train to Berlin.

18/19th September 98 - Berlin, Germany

This took the 'Best Venue' award; an open-air arena set near the Olympic complex, a sort of Amphitheatre sunk in some woods. From the front not only did you get a good view of DM, you also had a great view of the crowd sat all around you behind you, which made great spectacles on songs such as "NLMDA" and "Personal Jesus". Both nights were packed out and brilliant. My only regret is that they did not change one or two songs on the second night.

20th September 98 – Erfurt, Germany

Three gigs in a row take its toll, so I wonder how the band must feel! My voice is going with all the singing and I feel really tired, some of it may be due to the many late nights I have been having recently! The concert for me was a bit of a disappointment, but that may be due to fatigue more than with the concert itself.

21st September 98 - Day off

Some much needed sleep!

22nd September 98 - Brussels, Belgium

After catching train to Brussels, met several Germans who had made the trip over the border. Forest National is a great venue, nice and compact, it had a cosy feel about it. The concert was needless to say brilliant.



23rd September 98 – Stuttgart, Germany

The train journey took all day from Belgium, but from what I saw of Stuttgart it was a very nice place. The venue was a very modern messeshalle and DM gave a very slick performance.

24th September 98 - Munich, Germany

A day off so chose to go to Munich for the Oktoberfest. Great idea! And Great Beer!

25th September 98 - Zurich, Switzerland

The concert - it was a disaster. Dave sang wrong verse on "NLMDA" and his voice started to break up on "OWILM". Martin sang "A Question of Lust" and "Home", but "Condemnation" was dropped from the set list. Two lines missed from "BOAG" due to Dave's voice being rough. "Stripped" and "I Feel You" also dropped from the set list. In the end, a bad night. I felt sorry for the Swiss fans who would be attending this one concert only and saw DM not at their best.

26th September 98 - Bologna, Italy

A wonderful trip through the Alps by train, probably the most scenic in Europe. I met up with my sister in Bologna, come over especially to see DM in Milan, but also wanted to do Bologna. A bit apprehensive about this concert after last night, but Dave's voice has recovered. "Condemnation" and "I Feel You" still dropped, but a welcome return to "Stripped", even if the crowd had to sing most of it!

27th September 98 - Milan, Italy

A fantastic concert, the Italian fans went wild. The same two songs dropped as per last night, Dave now getting back on song, his voice sounding good again.

28th September 98 - Home!

After four weeks on the road, it was nice to fly home to get some clothes and catch up with a few things.

29/30th September 98 - London, England

The home gigs for me are always going to be special, and these two were good. With "Condemnation" and "I feel You" reinstated and Dave's voice really on song now. On the second gig, another cock up on "NLMDA", Dave singing the second verse this time, as opposed to Zurich, so he's balanced it all out!

2nd October 98 - Manchester, England

Awesome venue and similar to Helsinki in Finland. The crowd was really special tonight, very good concert and well polished.

3rd October 98 - Birmingham, England

The last UK gig for this tour was good. The seats at the front were a novelty as everybody stood anyway!

5/6th October 98 - Cologne, Germany

Flew out to Cologne from London and arrived at 6pm. Just enough time to get a ticket for the first concert. MTV cameras present on the first night, so a faultless performance from DM. The crowd were magnificent. On the second night, the crowd less vocal (MTV cameras not there?) and on "Enjoy the Silence" Martin's guitar not sounding

on the first two chords of the remix part of the song - Dave just pointing and laughing.

7th October 98 — Paris, France

Paris Bercy seemed to have grass growing on the outside of the venue - weird! Inside the venue was awesome, the acoustics where especially brilliant, the crowd were really up for it and DM played a blinder of a gig - brilliant!

8th October 98 - Paris to Hannover

Day spent travelling from Paris to Hannover by train and recharging the batteries after three gigs in a row.

9th October 98 - Hannover, Germany

Great crowd in a massive Messehalle, very wide so the acoustics not as good as Paris. In some areas of the venue it was a bit quiet. I quite liked the idea of putting that beer tent near the front of the stage!

10th October 98 – Leipzig, Germany

The second concert to be held in the former East Germany. The Messehalle was old and had character. Very loud towards the front, especially when Purity were strutting their stuff. The East Germans were very vocal, singing to every DM song.

11th October 98 – Frankfurt, Germany

Fantastic venue, the most complete show yet and the German crowd were very vocal again and very noisy, it was hard to hear DM above the din!

12th October 98 - Frankfurt to Munich

Day off so travelled to Munich, no Oktoberfest on, so a quiet night in.

13th October 98 - Munich, Germany

During the day I visited Fasson, Neuschwanstein castle which was spectacular amongst the autumnal leaves on the trees and the Alps. Off to the Olympic venue in Munich for the concert. We had seats and had a good look of the debacle going on below.... When DM came on stage the barrier at the front of the stage started to give way. About 30 to 40 security people were at the front trying to hold back the barrier and the hundreds of DM fans pushing their way forward. Meanwhile more security people were trying to re-fix the barrier back in place - it must have taken hour to get all this done. The concert sort of settled down a bit then - a good one but there was something missing.

14th October 98 - Munich to Zaragoza

This would be the toughest two days travelling yet. Train to Zurich for a train to Geneva, for an overnight train to Portbou (on the French/Spanish border) for another train to Barcelona, and then across to Zaragoza.

15th October 98 – Zaragoza, Spain

Eventually arrived at 1400hrs after travelling all day and all night and half of today again. Spanish fans queuing outside the venue already - and the doors do not open until 7pm! After all the travelling, the concert was brilliant and a bit of a relief as this was the last concert did not have a ticket for. Now knew that I would make all 32 concerts!

16th October 98 - Barcelona, Spain

My first time in Barcelona and the city is beautiful. The venue was part of the Olympic complex, which was quite a sight to see in itself. The crowd was awesome, and the concert too was quite fantastic, the best part was on the encore of "Just Can't Get Enough", the crowd chanting way after the band had stopped playing.

17th October 98 - San Sebastian, Spain

The last one and it had to be good. It was good - even though the crowd was not big, and getting right to the front was easy - the singing and chanting throughout the show was magnificent. When it all ended

and the lights went up, I was sad. And happy too

- to have done all 32 concerts in Europe!

The 1999 Los Angeles Depeche Mode Convention
The Palace - Hollywood, California, USA

This year's convention was an absolute blast! The promoters (London Calling, and KROQ) always manage to get the event packed, but this year it was completely sold out!

The event started at 6 pm. The "masses" were greeted with three different rooms of people selling various DM goodies (t-shirts, pins, posters, music...the typical stuff). After spending money on DM stuffs, people started filtering into the main area (dance floor). At 6:45 pm, Richard Blade (KROQ DJ) welcomed everyone, and introduced about 30 minutes of video I edited together for the event. Richard came back on stage after the video presentation and hosted the "Band Look-A-Like/Sing-A-Like" contest. Most of the contestants (all males this year) opted to sing, but the winner of the event was a guy dancing like David (usually is). We also had a "Name That Tune" contest that had the entire crowd screaming song titles as snippets of songs were played for the contestants picked from the crowd.

After the contests (and throughout the night), give-aways were being tossed to the crowd (12"s, posters, pins, T-shirts, and about four dozen Evil Bendys I still had at my house). Between contests, and the unannounced band of the night called Odium State, I was spinning DM tracks, as well as screening the entire 1997 Los Angeles Shrine Expo Ultra Show (special thanks to MTV for unknowingly helping out with that). This went on until a little past 10 pm.

When 10 pm hit (actually a few minutes past 10) the dancing began. I'm not one of the better DJ's in the world, but I had the crowd dancing until midnight, playing as many cool DM tracks as I could throw in (including some demo recordings, and some of my own remixes). While everyone was dancing, I was screening video on the big projection screen.

Midnight came upon us faster than I expected. I played the final two tracks of the night "Sister Of Night", and "Enjoy The Silence" from the 1998 KROQ Acoustic Christmas, got on the microphone, and said goodnight to everyone. The problem was the crowd just couldn't get enough. The entire crowd started scre aming for more Mode, and then a group of people that met from the depechemode.com message board (and flew long distances to meet at the event) started a "Just Can't Get Enough" chant. After failing at my explanation that The Palace security wanted us out, I decided to have them sing the song in a capella. They actually did it (don't doubt the devotion of DM fans). I finally gave in, and played "Just Can't Get Enough" (my co-DJ/helper/friend Arta pulling the CD for me as I tried to calm the crowd). From the crowd reaction, you'd think we were at a concert. They were singing along to the entire track (well...actually...L.A. crowds don't really sing along at concerts, but that's a different story). Even though I got a lecture from The Palace security as I was trying to leave, I'm glad I was able to help everyone have that moment. It was a great ending to a great night.

After everything was done, we were all sweating (almost 1500 people, mixed with weak air conditioning and dancing will do that to you), but happy! This was a welcome break from html coding, and I can't wait until the big 2000 convention!

I did it! I found a bootleg of the "KROQ Almost Acoustic Christmas", the performance by Depeche Mode. It was on T-Rex Records and I would advise every Mode fan to get it. I have heard other recordings of the show that were muffled but this is excellent quality. The show itself must have been awesome and some of the new live versions are fantastic. Dave sounds better than ever on vocals and the arrangements were brilliant. The disk contains "Barrel Of A Gun" which sounds better and more heavy than ever, "Policy Of Truth" which is sung to perfection, "It's No Good" again it sounds just great live and probably is the best version I've heard. Then Dave blasts the crowd with "Walking In My Shoes", Martin sings "Sister Of Night" and "A Question Of Lust" accompanied only by piano. This is an awesome feast for your ears. An almost harmonium maybe original "Enjoy The Silence" version is definitely a classic. The live Zephyr Mix of "In Your Room" is again heavier in style but another must-have. "Behind The Wheel" and "Personal Jesus" come after to great crowd response and finally the famed duet with Billy Corgan on "Never Let Me Down Again" is a perfect end to this CD. I paid \$25 for it and for the quality and the song versions would have paid a lot more. They should release this material, as it really is one of the best shows that I have heard from Depeche Mode on CD. It really shows that they are getting better with every show. Find it and buy it!

On "I Feel You" towards the end of the song Dave comes in too early and doesn't realise, so the band have to follow him, the only problem being the Midi System does what the computer says and not the band, which creates some rather strange sounds!
